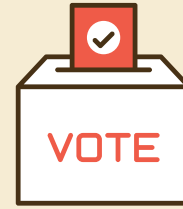

SAN FRANCISCO PROPOSITIONS

YES, PROP A

Funds critical services, parks, and street repair in response to COVID.

YES, PROP B

Brings transparency to Public Works by creating a community oversight agency.

YES, PROP C

Removes citizenship barriers to serving on City bodies.

YES, PROP D

Establishes a board to investigate the Sheriff's office for misconduct.

YES, PROP E

Means the City can make police staffing changes to increase social workers and mental healthcare.

YES, PROP F

Implements equitable tax changes so the biggest corporations are contributing the most. Will reduce the city budget deficit for next year.

YES, PROP G

Young people have much at stake in our elections and deserve the right to vote in municipal elections.

YES, PROP H

Streamlines permitting and allow flexibility to keep small businesses afloat.

YES, PROP I

Requires that property sales above \$10M include a contribution to emergency rent relief and permanent affordable housing.

YES, PROP J

Removes red tape so that existing parcel taxes can fund schools.

YES, PROP K

Authorizes up to 10,000 units of affordable social housing.

YES, PROP L

This will tax corporations if their CEOs are paying themselves 100 times or more the salary of their average employee.

YES, PROP RR

Caltrain will become cleaner, greener, and more affordable if this 1/8 cent sales tax is passed.

CALIFORNIA PROPOSITIONS



YES, PROP 14

Continues voter approved funding to expand research on cancer, Alzheimer's, and other conditions.



YES, PROP 15

Raises \$12 billion dollars a year for the state and \$800 million dollars for SF schools and public services. This measure affects only the largest, wealthiest corporations like Chevron and ensures they pay their fair share.



YES, PROP 16

Overtuns the racist Proposition 209 which banned affirmative action in state institutions.



YES, PROP 17

Allows nearly 50,000 people who are on parole to have the right to vote in CA.



YES, PROP 18

Expands the ability of young people to vote in primary elections as their 18th birthday approaches.



NO, PROP 19

Lets wealthy homeowners who buy a more expensive house pay lower property taxes.



NO, PROP 20

Increases number of people locked up in prisons.



YES, PROP 21

Allows cities to implement rent control for residential properties over 15 years old.



NO, PROP 22

Uber, Lyft, and other tech giants want to re-classify their employees as "independent contractors" to avoid labor protections such as minimum wage.



YES, PROP 23

Requires dialysis clinics to have liscensed physicians on site and report infection data.



NO, PROP 24

Rewrites the Consumer Privacy Act, and adds burdens to people who want to protect their personal information from being sold.

NO POSITION PROP 25

Replaces cash bail with a system based on perceived "public safety risk," and gives judges more power.

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
